

To quote an old beer commercial with a slight change, he is THE MOST INTEGRAL MAN IN THE GUILD!!!

WHY YOU ASK? This man comes in every other Sunday morning to clean the Dust Collection (DC) filters. He is usually aided by one or more of his team mates that include Allison Yanover and Camilo Banados-Burton. Butch takes this responsibility upon himself, unassumingly, and will not quit. Because he says, and I quote, "I don't want to let the Guild down".

Head to toe, covered in dust, not tall enough to reach the top knobs to release the filters when they are packed with sawdust, he never complains.

The Dust Collection system IS THE MOST IMPORTANT TOOL provided by your Guild. If it goes down, everything stops. Yes, it is an inconvenience when you are about two cuts away from finishing up on the table saw and the DC lights come on and you have to stop

When a Collector light flashes, the dust collector barrel is full and must be emptied.





and empty the barrels. But imagine coming to the Guild and no DC!!!

It is every member's responsibility to pay attention to the DC alert lights when using any equipment in the shop. The photos show what happens when the DC continues to run when the lights are flashing and no one stops the system. When this occurs, cleaning the filters becomes more difficult and time consuming.

Baltic Birch Update

If you have been in the lumber room recently, you might have noticed that we are nearly out of all Baltic Birch plywood. Our main supplier of Baltic Birch has depleted their stock and will not be stocking it anymore in the immediate future. This is due to problems dealing with Russia (where Baltic Birch is manufactured) and the exorbitant cost of getting it shipped to the US. There is some Baltic Birch still out there, but it would cost a Guild member \$140 -\$150 for one sheet of 34" 5 x 5 plywood. We have decided not to keep it in stock anymore in the near future. Our supplier has just received an alternative to Baltic Birch, and hopefully we will be receiving this new product in the near future at a price that is acceptable. Unfortunately, that leaves only two choices right now; either domestic maple or imported birch, both at considerably higher prices than we would like to pay. Be assured that we are working with our suppliers to obtain the best product we can at the best price possible.


Hardwood Update

The biggest shock in the lumber room right now is the cost of soft white maple, which has seen an increase in price of around 60% over the last six months. There has been unprecedented demand for soft maple, which is currently by far the most favored wood among cabinet and furniture builders. While prices are beginning to moderate, maple prices are expected to remain high in the foreseeable future. Within the cabinet and furniture industry, maple items are most typically painted and many manufacturers are now switching to brown maple or even cherry for their painted products. Who would have thought that we would see the day when it was cheaper to build a cabinet from cherry rather than maple? Indeed, in our lumber room, cherry is cheaper than soft white maple.




