Meet Brian Brace, who handcrafts fine furniture from his Black Mountain workshop in North Carolina. Brian works primarily in the Arts and Crafts style, while incorporating his own creative style, calling it "Arts and Crafts with a twist".

### **Brian Brace Bio**

At 14, Brian Brace made a two-story clubhouse with a neighbor using leftover lumber from his parents' deck in a small town in the mountains of Vermont. He knew back then that he wanted to build. While still in high school, he began a fine woodworking apprenticeship under a local master furniture maker. Upon completing the 8,000-hour apprenticeship program at age 20, he became the first to achieve Vermont State certification. His five-year journeymanship followed, beginning in Vermont and extending to Naples, FL. In 2004, his dream of being a Master came true when he opened his first shop in Naples. In 2010, he expanded that dream by relocating back to the forests in the North Carolina town of Black Mountain.

Brian's belief is that fine furniture should be crafted to endure use over multiple lifetimes - to be passed on to future generations. Each piece he makes goes through an extensive series of time-honored processes. From thoughtfully selecting the finest lumber, to applying hand rubbed oil finishes, every step is carefully executed to achieve the highest quality standards. All of Brian's pieces are constructed using traditional mortise and tenon joinery, which maximizes wood strength, while forming pieces pleasing to the eye.

Brian is a Roycroft Master Artisan, a Vermont Certified Master Craftsman, Southern Highland Artisan, and a Piedmont Craftsmen Artisan. His work was featured in a Gustav Stickley American Craftsman Documentary.

Brian has been a featured Craftsman at the Grovewood Gallery at the Grove Park Inn in Asheville, NC and was a participating artist in the 32nd annual Arts and Crafts Conference at Asheville's Omni Grove Park Inn. He has been featured in the Arts and Craft magazine, Arts and Craft Homes, and the Revival Magazine.






