Meet Jim & Christine Smith, woodturners and carvers from Murphy, NC, who turn out beautiful works of art that are inspired by the nature around them.

BIO – Jim & Christine Smith

As a husband-and-wife team, Jim and Christine feel they have overriding passion and strong persistence to master the unusual. They feel their work takes on a metaphor for life and nature and therefore, their work is simply a tribute to nature's creations.

Their work is a reflection of shared impressions from nature and wildlife around them. Their collective goal is to recreate the natural beauty of nature by adeptly turning & carving wood to obtain the most pleasing shape possible. Additional skills are applied with a variety of techniques, including hollowing, relief carving, and coloring, all of which helps embellish the wood tones.

Christine takes great care in carving her birds, all the while keeping in mind what they look like in the wild. She uses a variety of techniques, including pyrography (decorating with burn marks), carving, and mild sanding called stoning.

When selecting woods for their turned boxes, hollow forms, and salt & pepper mills, they use woods that are both attractive and lend themselves well to the craft at hand. Over the course of developing their combined skills, they have used embellishments to help accent their work.

Both Christine and Jim truly immerse themselves in the tasks of carving or turning to make their work a true complement to the host from which it was taken from.

Christine and Jim are members of the Carolina Mountain Woodturners, the Brasstown Woodturners Guild, and the American Association of Woodturners. Christine is also a member of the Southern Highland Craft Guild.







Thank you, Veterans!

November 11, 2023 is Veterans Day, commemorating the service of all US veterans; this year Veterans Day will be observed on Friday, November 10. We should never forget that the freedoms we enjoy as Americans have been secured for us by our veterans.

Washington, DC has many impressive monuments. Juxtaposed with the numerous monuments to the ideals of freedom are reminders of the price of that freedom. Over 400,000 veterans are buried at Arlington National Cemetery. On the mall are the World War II Memorial, the Vietnam Memorial, and the Korean War Memorial. Etched in stone are thousands upon thousands of names of military members who died in these wars. At the Korean War Memorial, etched in black granite, is the phrase "FREEDOM IS NOT FREE." To all of the many veterans at the Greenville Woodworkers Guild, thank you for your service.



The Greenville Woodworkers Guild honors its veterans through our Urns for Veterans Project. Since 2017, the Guild has supplied urns for the unclaimed cremains of veterans to be interred in veterans' cemeteries in Beaufort, Florence, and Anderson, South Carolina. This project is led by John Arnold and Rob Barhorst who developed

and designed the urn, a sample of which is on display in our lobby. Nationally, this work is carried out by the Missing in America Project (www. miap.us). MIAP's purpose is to locate, identify, and inter the unclaimed cremains of American Veterans. Since 2007. MIAP has located over 30.000 cremains in mortuaries and hospitals, identified 6,568 and interred 6.186 of those veterans. The Greenville Woodworkers Guild provided urns for over 200 of these veterans in South Carolina. The Charleston County Coroner wrote thanking the Guild for the "9 beautifully crafted urns for the unclaimed veterans. With your help we were able to properly lay these men to rest with honor and respect." Thanks, John and Rob, for leading this project and for serving our community through woodworking.

I want to remind you of a couple of upcoming events. The deadline for the Hartness Award is November 10. To submit a piece of your work, upload photos through the website. If your piece is selected, you will bring the actual work into the Guild to be judged. The Hartness Award will be announced at the Christmas Dinner, which will be Monday, December 4, at 6:00 PM.


