## MYSTERY SPEAKER TELLS ALL.

Find out little known facts that you may not have asked yourself that influences your woodworking.

## Bio

I started woodworking at school when I was eleven. This was a required class and was using hand tools. The requirement carried on to school leaving at 16. My father changed jobs and I had to change schools. Unfortunately the new school was not as enlightened so my formal woodworking education stopped. When I left school I started a five-year engineering apprenticeship with the deHavilland engine company. I started working for my degree on day release (one day a week) and evening classes and eventually obtained a Degree in mechanical engineering from London University. (A disappointment was that if I had been a couple of years older I would have worked on the replica of the Wright Flyer that is in the Science Museum in London.)

When I completed my apprenticeship I was employed by DH Engines in the rocket engine division.

I joined CAV after a couple of false starts in other areas and made my career in diesel fuel injection equipment. This took me to Italy as the resident engineer, then to Japan for a start-up there and then back to England for several years. My specialty became matching the system to the customers engines. I put a new product into production during this time.

During this time I did very little woodworking but did “do up” our house in London and added an extension. I found that my metal working training helped me with woodworking. This project was completed in time for our move to the US in 1978 for a start-up here.

Shortly after we came here I was in Barnes and Noble looking at a woodworking book when a stranger asked if I knew about the Guild. (I wish I could remember

who it was.) I did not, but attended the next meeting and joined the Guild.

I had built a lathe shortly before we went to India (plans were in Fine Woodworking). This was another start-up and was supposed to be for three years that became nine.

We left India in 2000 when I retired. I had intended to build a boat when I retired but eventually I decided that in the uneasy environment post 911 “a hole in the water into which you pour money” was not a sound plan. So a bit later I bought a lathe and I have done very little flat work since.
